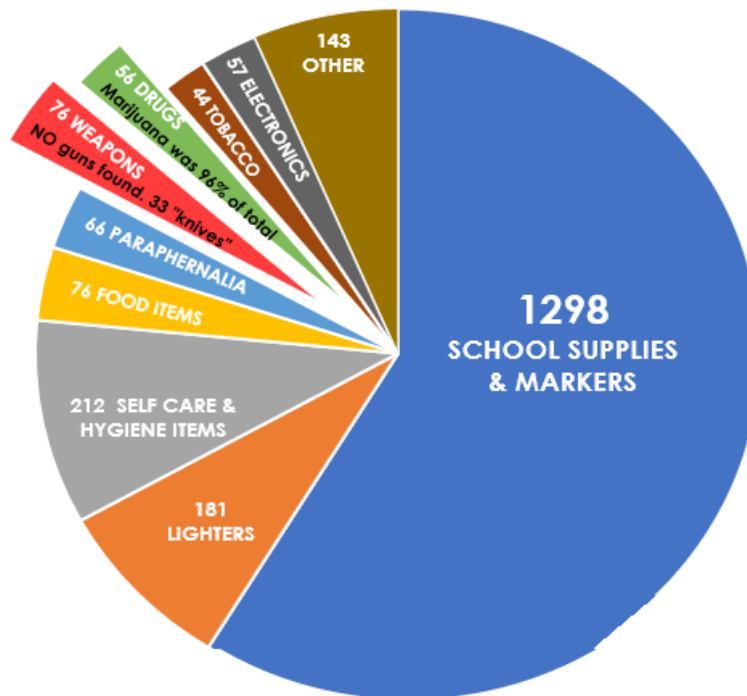


### LAUSD Random Search Data Points

- In the 2013-14 school year, LAUSD spent over \$500,000 conducting up to 180,000+ random student searches. The searches recovered no guns and 13 “knives.”
- In the 2014-15 school year, up to 200,000+ random searches were conducted, with no guns and 20 “knives” recovered.
- One-third of all “knives” found in random searches were utility, tool, or small pocket or “butter” knives.
- Over both school years, there were up to **380,000+ random searches costing LAUSD over a million dollars** district-wide that only resulted in:
  - 1 BB gun +1 stun gun + 1 brass knuckles +1 electric shocker + 1 “shank”
  - 2 batons + 2 mace sprays + 2 shells/bullets
  - 15 razor blades, box cutters, or exacto blades combined
  - 17 pepper sprays (frequently worn by young girls on keychains for out of school protection)
  - And 33 “knives” for a total of 76 weapons out of 380,000+
    - **Roughly 1 out of every 5,097 weapon hit rate from the random searches**
- Only 59 out of the roughly 180 schools configured for grades 6-12 recovered a weapon in the two school years.
- There were 346 instances where over a dozen students were searched at once, and several instances where over 100 students were search at once.
- Students are frequently targeted and subjected to random searches for being late or tardy.
- After revisiting the paraphernalia items, fewer drugs were recovered in random searches than originally reported. There were previously instances where paraphernalia, seeds, containers, and 3 “empty container with marijuana wax residue” were coded as drugs. After the corrections, there were only 56 instances where drugs were found in random searches over the two school years.
- Cocaine and heroin were recovered once each in the hundreds of thousands of random searches. Both were recovered at Bell High a week apart. The preliminary data analysis did not distinguish the instances, but the searches accounted for the 4% (or 2 out of 46) drug searches where marijuana was not recovered. So marijuana was 96% of the illegal drugs, not 97% as presented on to the board on Tuesday.
- K9 police dogs are being used in the random searches at some schools despite the district policy/claims that 1) the policy is focused on weapons and 2) is not conducted by police officers.
- The previous pie chart presented to the district included extra records from the 2016-17 school year. After removing those records, the finds are as followed.
